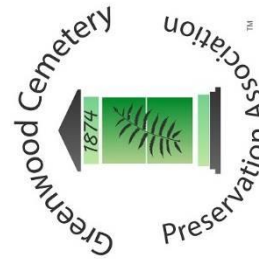

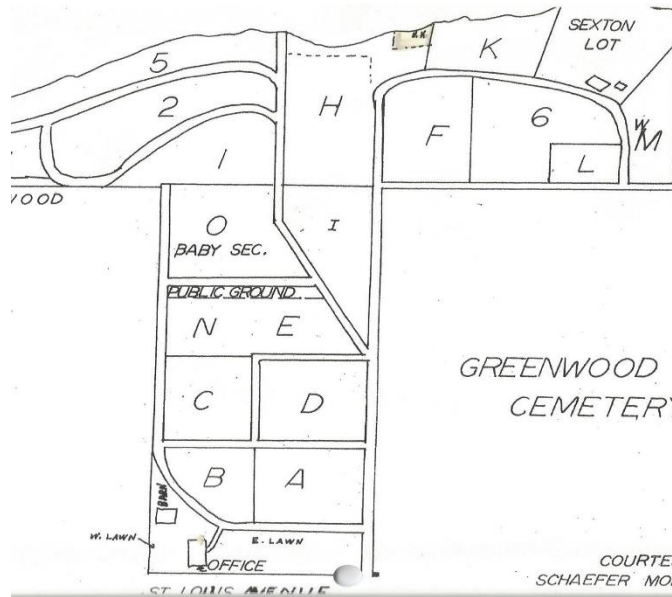


Greenwood Cemetery Legacy

There is no doubt of Greenwood's historic, cultural, and social importance to St. Louis, and particularly St. Louis African Americans. In February 2004, the cemetery was listed on the National Register of Historic Places. There are musicians, civil rights leaders and other key individuals associated with the development of black St. Louis buried here. The condition of the cemetery, many of its stones, and burial records, currently make it difficult to access the entire cemetery. Greenwood holds enormous promise as an educational and tourist resource.

Greenwood Cemetery 31.85 acres over 50,000 burials

Historic Greenwood Cemetery was organized in 1874 to serve the needs of the growing black population of post-civil war St. Louis and St. Louis County. It was the first commercial non-sectarian cemetery for African Americans in the St. Louis metropolitan area. More than 50,000 African Americans are buried within Greenwood's 31.85 acres. Greenwood Cemetery was listed on the National Register of Historic Places on February 26, 2004.
